Letter From the President

A Reminder

ummaging through books and papers, photos and mementos in yet another effort to "clean house and straighten the files," I paused to open the pages of Alpha Eta, the Story of Beta Theta Pi at Denison University by Francis Wayland Shepardson AH41. The book tells such a wonderful story of Beta at Denison ...

I was among 19 newly pledged Betas in 1937, the year the volume was published and the year "Shep" died. Beloved by our fraternity and indeed throughout the "Greek world," Shep died just days before he was to preside over the 98th annual convention of Beta Theta Pi.

It was September 26, 1937, when we Alpha Eta pledges gathered — dark trousers, white shirts and pledge pins — in Granville's Maple Grove cemetery. Each of us layed a rose upon the grave of a man whom we had never known, never really heard of before that solemn

day. We had been at Denison, associated with the fraternity just a few days.

The pledges who gathered together that day would all be initiated into the Alpha Eta Chapter of Beta Theta Pi. We would certainly come to learn about Shep and what he gave to our fraternity. World War II claimed us for service throughout the world. Some of us never came back. Today there are but a few of us still around to remember that day we placed the roses on Shep's

grave. But we won't forget that day nor the days we have spent together in dear old Beta Theta Pi.

I have been in touch with a few dear brothers from my Alpha Eta days of long ago. I have had the pleasure and privilege of meeting and being with Betas in many places. I truly enjoy being in Beta alumni groups. I treasure those associations and am proud to say "Glad I'm a Beta!"

Mrs. Roudebush had been a civic volunteer all of her life. She began her career as a social worker with the Red Cross and was a USO volunteer. She was an active member of First Baptist church, the Country Garden Club and the Cleveland Denison Women's Club. She also volunteered with the YMCA and served on the women's committee of the Cleveland Council on World Affairs. Survivors include her sons, **George '49** of Chardon, Ohio, and **Tim '52** of Overland Park, Kan.; a daughter, Jane R. Daganhardt of Granville, Ohio; 11 grandchildren; and 28 great-grandchildren. Her husband, George, died in 1992.

Dr. Charles G. Brown Jr. AH 420 died February 16, 2000, in Mansfield, Ohio, after a long illness. He was a biology major at

Denison in the Class of 1933. He earned his M.D. degree at The Ohio State University in 1938. Charlie was a family physician in Mansfield for 51 years before his retirement. He is survived by his wife, Nancy, two sons, a daughter, eight grandchildren and a brother.

George W. Alexander AH 712, of Grayling, Mich., died February 23, 2000. He earned a B.S. degree in civil engineering from the University of Michigan in 1957. Following service in the U.S. Marine Corps during the Korean War, he returned to the University of Michigan to earn a J.D. degree in 1967. He earned the rank of captain during the Korean War and received the Navy Cross for heroic service. George was in private law practice for several years before being appointed public defender of Washtenaw County, Mich. In 1974, he was elected to the newly created 15th District judgeship where he served until his retirement in 1991.

He is survived by his wife, Peggy, brother, **Charles AH 749**, a daughter, a grandson, a granddaughter and two stepsons.

D. Michael Poast AH 886 died October 14, 1999, in Cincinnati, Ohio. He was an economics major in the Class of 1961 at Denison. In 1964 he earned his law degree from Harvard University and in 1970 an MBA degree from Xavier University. Mike was a partner in the law firm of Rendigs, Fry, Kiely and Dennis in Cincinnati, specializing in corporate litigation. He was a member of the Ohio State and American Bar Associations. An avid sailor and squash player, Mike served as a member of the Lanson Stage Curtis Memorial Association Board of Trustees for a number of years.
