# A Man of Action, Tyler Blair Helped Re-Found Beta Theta Pi and Brought the Fraternity's Leadership Training to All Students

Tyler's Experiences in Alpha Eta Helped Determine His Career Choice

Senior **Tyler Blair** was given an opportunity to re-colonize the Alpha Eta Chapter of Beta Theta Pi Fraternity. Recently retiring from serving three years on the Executive Committee, Tyler is currently an Admissions Intern at the Admissions Office and the Co-Tour Guide Coordinator. Tyler's experience with Beta Theta Pi also motivated him to create two new leadership opportunities at Denison. As one of the re-founding fathers, he graduates this year with a degree in Sociology/Anthropology with a concentration in Organization Studies.

### 1. Why did you choose Beta Theta Pi?

I never imagined joining a fraternity. But at the beginning of my sophomore year, I was given the opportunity to recolonize the Alpha Eta Chapter of Beta Theta Pi Fraternity. I saw the chance to start something new, to build a new organization from the ground up based upon values and principles, and to leave a legacy at Denison as well as restart the rich legacy that Beta always had on campus.

# 2. What were your responsibilities as a re-founding father?

As one of 29 founding fathers, I was charged with the responsibility of working together with my fellow founding fathers to rebuild this historic organization, focusing on becoming an exemplary collegiate fraternal society based upon values and principles.

# 3. What were your responsibilities as President?

I helped lead the group through its growing stage as it develops into a fully operating chapter. Over the last year, I have worked with the colony toward receiving its charter in August 2008. My responsibilities varied day by day, which always kept things exciting and challenging, but very rewarding.

# 4. Please explain the two new leadership opportunities you created on campus, D.U. LEAD and Men's Leadership Academy.

Upon returning from one of the Beta Theta Pi's leadership programs, The Wooden Institute for Men of Principle, I saw the opportunity to bring what I learned back to campus and to produce a leadership program for all Denison students. The program had tremendous success, and the university has agreed to continue supporting D.U. LEAD as an annual program as long as it remains a student initiative. D.U. LEAD, a one-day leadership institute, teaches first-year students how to become effective leaders on campus and how to make the most of their Denison career.

Most recently, I developed a second leadership program, the DU Men's Leadership Academy. It addresses the lack of men's leadership across college campuses. I implemented a one-day workshop for first-year men at Denison to address the consistent gender gap

between college men and women. With sponsorship from the First-Year Office and support from the Student Activities Office, I gathered 13 men to discuss the gap and to create a community of leaders among the participants. The program had overwhelming success, and the group of men is already talking about ways they can get more first-year men involved.

# 5. What are your plans after you graduate?

I have decided to attend University of Kansas next year to pursue a Master's Degree in Higher Education, as well as serve as a Greek Life Advisor in their Greek Life Office.

# 6. What do you feel is your chapter's greatest accomplishment while you have been an active brother?

Recruitment! We have always struggled with recruitment and getting our numbers up. This past year, we realized the significance of recruitment, and we poured our hearts into it and recruited 15 new men this year, doubling our size! And best of all, we did this without sacrificing any of our standards or values, and each of our new men is true Beta material.

# 7. What is your advice for future generations of Beta Theta Pi?

Never forget who we are, what we stand for and what makes us different from the rest.

# **IN MEMORIAM**

**Sam Chapman '44**, member of Beta Theta Pi and long-time resident of Tucson, AZ, passed away on January 27, 2007 at the age of 86. He was a star football lineman at Denison before WWII, then served in both the U.S. Navy and the Merchant Marines. He retired in 1986 from a long career as sales manager for Woolrich, Incorporated, a leading clothing manufacturer.

Ross Morgan Jr. '49, member of Beta Theta Pi, passed away November 29, 2006. Ross graduated from Fairmont High School in 1943, and later that year enlisted in the U.S. Army. Serving in the 87<sup>th</sup> Division of General Patton's 3<sup>rd</sup> Army, Sergeant Morgan was honored for his "initiative, leadership, and courage" and for "heroic achievement in action" when presented with the Bronze Star on March 25, 1945.

Following the war, Ross enrolled at Denison University in Granville, where he majored in Business and played football for the legendary Woody Hayes. He found fellowship, fun and lifelong friendships within the halls of Beta Theta Pi.

After graduating from Denison in 1949, he embarked on an advertising career, and in 1953 he joined Campbell-Ewald, one of the nation's premier advertising agencies. Ross retired in 1987 as account supervisor and senior vice president.
