Beta Dominates on Campus

Alpha Eta Boasts Largest Spring Pledge Class, Highest Fraternity GPA , Strong Commitment to Community Service and a Presidential Medal-Winning Graduating Senior

Alpha Eta is proud to report a strong recruitment this past spring, recruiting 12 new members from all over the country. The chapter also welcomed four additional pledges this fall.

We're even more proud to boast a 3.21 GPA, the highest of all Denison fraternities. We put an added emphasis to ensure academic achievement among brothers by setting up study sessions and tutoring sessions for those who are near the GPA cutoff. Alpha Eta was presented with an award from the University for having the highest GPA.

Additionally, Paul "Yubo" Young was one of seven Denison students to win a coveted Presidential Medal from Denison this spring. The award is presented to graduating seniors

who have excelled in some combination of service to the community, contribution to the arts, enlargement of global perspective, athletic fitness, leadership and contributions to the community.

Philanthropically, the chapter raised

\$1,400 for Big Brothers Big Sisters through their wing-eating contest King of the Wing, an annual event held each spring. In the spring the brothers also had a team in KATs with Bats, a whiffle ball tournament hosted by Kappa Alpha Theta. This fall, the chapter will once again participate in Delta Gamma's annual Anchor Splash competition to benefit the sorority's philanthropy, Service for Sight. Last fall Beta placed second in the competition (find a great video of our dance number from the event posted on our chapter's Facebook page!).



Here are a few early results:

1. Do you consider your membership in Beta to be a lifelong commitment or experience? Why or why not?

- "Yes, we have to keep building bridges for others."
- "Yes, because of friendships renewed and cemented more firmly than ever at each reunion."
- "No. It fit my needs then but I have moved on and I don't covet many of the traditions of fraternity life."

Do you have a favorite memory from you undergrad days?

My Hell Week experience: Shortly after winning the heavyweight champion in IM wrestling as a freshman, beating a senior Phi Gam varsity football captain, the brothers thought it be cute to ask me "to wrestle myself." That

led to a separated shoulder and a trip to the hospital and the end of my hell week.

Thank you to **Dale Wolfe** '54 for participating in this Q&A...

What do you see as the biggest difference in fraternity life and membership compared to when you graduated?

The biggest difference is living in the fraternity house. Living there offered many informal and unplanned opportunities for the brothers to be with each other and discus the happenings or non-happenings of the day or week, or athletic games, academic situations and on and on. Living together also provided opportunities for leadership development. The brothers did not hesitate to complain if they felt nothing was being done to correct problems that could be corrected. They also praised a job well done.

Another big difference was the use of the black ball in voting on potential new mem-

bers. Many terrific students were turned down by the Betas because of this rule. I assume the membership is more diversified now

Any advice for the volunteers who are running the alumni relations program?

I recently attended my 60th class reunion and was disappointed that there was no reception or get together of the Betas that were back for their reunions. I went to the Beta house but no volunteers were there so I looked around as best I could. It would be nice to have a happy hours or get together of some kind to alumni attending special occasions.

What are some of the best memories from your fraternity days?
